#### PARISH CLERK AND RESPONSIBLE FINANCIAL OFFICER

Applications are invited for the post of part-time Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer to the Starston Parish Council.

Applicants should have sound IT skills and have access to a computer and printer. They will also need basic experience in financial accounting and budgeting, be able to prepare an agenda for meetings and then take accurate minutes of those meetings. They will also be required to update and maintain the Parish Council area of the village web site for which training will be given.

Applicants will need to be self-motivated and be able to work on their own. They will also need attention to detail, resilience, diplomacy, tact and good communication skills, (written and verbal). Some evening work is involved.

Previous experience as a parish clerk is not essential as training is available for specialist



aspects of the job such as planning legislation and the legislative framework in which parish councils operate. However the role carries legal responsibilities within local government and following the Localism Act 2011 more responsibilities are being passed to Parishes. Hence, the applicant needs to have an interest in local democracy i.e. the voice of local peoplebeing heard and influencing what goes on in the village.

The salary will be within the NALC/SLCC Scale LC1. The starting salary will be £10.26 an hour and 25% of phone and broadband expenses will be paid.

### **Red Feather Club - Horham**

Visiting the Red Feather Club museum in a former NCOs' club has been described as like "stepping back in time". The museum commemorates the "friendly invasion" of WW2 that saw East Anglia play host to tens of thousands of American servicemen. In 1944, for example, there were more than 71,000 in Suffolk and for much of the later part of the war one in seven people in the county were from the US.



The arrival of the 95th Bomb Group's B-17 Flying Fortresses at Horham airfield in June 1943 had a huge impact on the surrounding villages – the influx of 3,000 US servicemen swamped this quiet corner of Suffolk. Part of the Mighty Eighth Air Force, the 95th flew 321 missions from Horham, including the first daylight bombing raid on Berlin on 4th March, 1944. They were awarded the Presidential Unit Citation on three occasions, the most of any Bomb Group.



Glenn Miller famously played in one of the hangars at Horham airfield on his final tour before his disappearance. The club now has its own in-house big-band – Skyliner – which regularly plays at dances at the club. The 95th Bomb Group Heritage Association, which operates and manages the Red Feather Club, holds other events throughout the year such as quizzes and film shows.

The period-perfect Red Feather Club is in itself a living memorial to the men of the 95th but in recent years three memorials have been unveiled on the site. Famously, one room in the complex even houses original murals painted by one of the men of the 95th. The Red Feather Club is also now home to the 1285th Military Police Company re-enactors group, Liberation 44, with their own guardroom.

Public open days are the last Sunday of the month from April to October, 10.00 am – 4.00 pm. The association welcomes group visits from schools and other organisations. 
#### **Does Your Dog Have a Microchip?**

A new law, which makes it mandatory for owners to microchip their dogs, comes into force in England on 6th April. Supporters of this law say that it will promote animal welfare and help owners be reunited with lost pets faster.

The Government believes the legislation could save councils and charities up to  $\pounds 33m$  a year. Owners who have failed to microchip their pets after the 6th April will be guilty of a criminal offence and could face a fine of  $\pounds 500$ .

## **EDP Community Chest Vouchers**

#### The Man With The Elephant Tattoo by Tim Kirkwood (with apologies to Stieg Larsson)

Stop! We heard the shout, together with the sound of running feet coming towards us. We turned to see two men chasing us down the path in the direction from which we had just travelled. They each were holding something in their hands. As they got closer we could see that in fact they were holding pistols. It seemed that we were about to be attacked.

We were a mixed group of tourists - mostly young or, if not, trying to relive their youth - who were on a five day, guided trek backpacking through the semimountainous area to the north of Chiang Mai. The route took us close to the borders between what was then Burma, Thailand and Laos, crossing the famous or perhaps infamous 'Golden Triangle' of drug trafficking fame.

Our guide was a tough looking guy who claimed to have fought alongside the Americans in Cambodia and Vietnam some ten years or so before. The route that we followed took us through a number of hillside and mountain villages inhabited by the Karen peoples where we slept in wooden huts each night. The main local activity apart from farming was logging (now banned) - involving the use of teams of elephants to provide the heavy lifting.

The walk had gone well. Apart from having had the opportunity to observe at close quarters a different way of life, we had enjoyed the amazing scenery and wild life, and swum in clear if chilly streams that flowed down through the jungle, whilst the more adventurous or perhaps misguided of us had taken advantage of the opium pipe which our guide had passed around each night. We were now on the last day, which was due to finish with a boat ride down the Mekong River back towards our base.

Maybe it was a drug induced euphoria and the attitude of our guide that suggested to me initially that the arrival of the two men was just a planned part of the walk, with a pretend robbery being staged that was meant to add an additional harmless touch of colour and excitement to our journey through what was known to be a potentially dangerous area. Certainly our guide appeared totally relaxed and nonchalant about the whole event, standing a little way off from the rest of us and just watching what was going on.

It soon became clear that in fact we were being robbed at gun point. One of the men stopped at the rear of the column whilst the other made his way to the front, where I

happened to be standing. He stood guard, waving his (very rusty) gun vaguely in my direction, but I could not help noticing the smile on his face and the depiction of an elephant which he had had tattooed on each hand.

His companion worked his way along the line of walkers, relieving them of their money before eventually reaching me. I took out my wallet and offered it to him. He ignored the credit cards but seized the notes that I was carrying before handing the wallet back. Nothing else was taken. They wanted cash only. Having completed their task, the two men disappeared back up the jungle trail.

My emotions veered from initial intense fear, especially since the guns appeared capable of going off on their own accord, to anger about being robbed, and then a sense of relief that it could all have ended much worse-and the realisation that the amount that I had lost was not really that great - only just about enough to buy a modest dinner in a Chiang Mai restaurant. Later on, as we discussed what had happened, my feelings turned to irritation when it transpired that my more worldly (or jungle) wise companions had lost even less than me, with most of their money having been hidden down their socks!

A few years later I found myself in the Soho district of London late at night and anxious for something to eat I wandered into a Thai restaurant. On finishing my meal I asked for the bill. When it arrived I glanced up at the waiter who had a smile on his face which brought back images of a certain mountain path. The hands which held the bill were marked by elephant tattoos.

I went to pay by credit card but the waiter stopped me, politely explaining that it was cash only (more memories). By then, however, whenever I was walking anywhere I considered dangerous I made sure that my money was well hidden. I reached down to one off my socks and withdrew the required amount. I paid, thanked the waiter, and left.

My route to the nearest underground station took me down a dark and lonely alley. I was half way along when I heard the cry of stop and turned to see a man running towards me holding something in one of his hands. It was the waiter from the restaurant and he was returning my wallet, which in my confusion I had left on the table.

I returned to the restaurant some months later but there was no sign of the tattooed waiter. I never saw him again. I would like to think that he had returned to his home in those beautiful mountains to the north of Chiang Mai. And that now he always remembered to check out the socks.

### Parish Council News

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on 29th February. As you may already know, the BT cabinet on Church Hill is now fully functioning and providing access to superfast broadband for some Parish residents. Following a meeting on 26th January, the Jubilee Hall Management Committee and Trustees have agreed to progress a community superfast broadband WiFi hotspot being established at the Jubilee Hall (and car park), if funding can be secured by the Parish Council. This is at present being investigated. Discussions are continuing at many levels of Government to increase availability to those unable to connect directly to such cabinets.

As was probably anticipated, for the first time in 7 years, Norfolk is to raise its portion of the Council Tax by 3.3%, which equates to £4.75 for Band D residences. The Government incentive to freeze Council Tax charges came to an end in November 2015.

As you will see from page 9, a vacancy has arisen for Parish Clerk. I took on a large teaching post last September, and in wanting to continue working for the Parish, tried to maintain both that post and my role as Clerk. Unfortunately this is proving untenable and, reluctantly, a choice has had to be made. We currently have a wonderful and very enthusiastic Parish Council and I have thoroughly enjoyed working with them over this past year.

In the light of Starston's planned Queen's 90th Birthday celebrations, a grant application to SNC has been successful, and the Parish has been given £400 to spend on the event.

#### **Health Promotion Event**



### Starston Community Speed-Watch

This is some of the data which the Speed-Watch team gets from SAM2 which shows what is happening with speeding traffic in the village. This particular Traffic Analysis Report covers the period from 27th January to 24th February this year. The road surveyed was from Brook Cottage on the Harleston Road for traffic travelling from Harleston into the village.

The maximum speed logged was 63 mph. The total number of vehicles during this period was 39,479.

The chart below shows the number of vehicles and what speed they were doing. As you can see over 73% of them were breaking the speed limit.


# Notes from a Travelling Starston Gardener

The effort and the ingenuity are especially apparent as you travel on the cable car from the sea front up to the village of Monte, where we were staying, or take the bus down into the town. It was rare to see an unkempt, unloved plot.

Besides the private gardens there were public spaces to enjoy - The Botanical Garden, the parks, like the Jardim de Sao Francisco, right in the centre

of Funchal and, my favourite, the garden of the Governor's official residence. The

### April - from the Latin verb 'aperire', to open

As I write this short message for the April magazine, I am engulfed in sunlight. Earlier, Roscoe, my dog, took me for a walk in our garden. As we walked, Roscoe's tail was flying around as if mimicking the dance of the whirling Dervishes. He was happy and content and very interested in the new things about him. He picked up bits of twig that had fallen off the trees in the wind overnight. He sniffed at the daffodils and hyacinths. I kept a close eye on him as, though he is learning fast what he can and cannot do, if the mood takes him, which is quite often, his own wants override his learned common sense and the scented colourful heads of plants become a gourmet's delight. As I watched, I began to take a greater interest in what was in front of me and I could almost hear the noise of the opening shoots of flowers in the borders and other parts of the garden. I could enjoy all of this because the weather let me open up too; I was not wearing my woolly hat nor my gloves, my scarf was not around my face distorting my vision.

Spring, the time of opening, was here, what a feeling of release and beauty as nature began its spring ritual of opening up too, showing us its buds and new shoots, the trailer of things to come. Colour, wonderful perfumes filling the air, fresh vegetables all enticing, the wakening of the bees as they strengthened their wings to fly free and find nectar. The hive, so silent in the cold days of winter, was coming alive with the exciting sound of buzzing active bees. Thinking about the newness of spring, I was reminded of a quote from the actor John Wayne: *"Tomorrow is the most important thing in life. Comes into us at midnight very clean. It's perfect when it arrives and it puts itself in our hands. It hopes we've learned something from yesterday".* 

The coming of spring is also a time to put things right, changing those things that are wrong. We start with a clean sheet as the Serenity Prayer written by Reinhold Niebuhr also encourages us.

"God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

My wish for you all this springtime, is that you can leave the bad bits of last year behind and start afresh with renewed hope and purpose. May I leave you with these words from 2 Corinthians 5.17:

"Therefore if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new."

### **County Council News**

An increasing number of schools in Norfolk are 'good' or 'better' according to updated information from Ofsted. By 31st December 81% of Norfolk schools were graded 'good' or 'outstanding', compared to 71% at the same point a year earlier. Also, good luck to Harleston Primary School which has been shortlisted in the Norfolk Eco awards celebrating their eco-friendly achievements.

At NCC our Highway Parish Partnership Scheme is funding 122 local highway related schemes which have been identified as a priority for local residents. This fund supports these schemes with 50% of funding, with the other 50% coming from the town and parish councils. One of the main issues for local people is speeding traffic and this year we had 39 successful bids for SAM2 machines which will be used by local volunteers.

It was good to see so many local residents and groups at the recent South Norfolk Community awards evening. Shortlisted were Peter Grimble, for his involvement with the Glebe Meadow, the Jubilee Hall and Bee group; the Pulham Crown, which has set up quarterly local community group meetings, collected money for charities and set up a food awareness scheme with the local school; and Harleston's Future, the many volunteers from the town who commit their spare time to put on events such as the antiques fair, summer street party and the Christmas lights switch-on.


#### **Pennoyer Film Night News**
