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






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## Notes from the Editor

# **Pigeon Post Photo Competition**

Following our successful short story competition at the end of last year, Pigeon Post has now decided to run a photo competition. We are looking for photographs which show some aspect of life in Starston, indoors or out. The competition is open to anyone who reads Pigeon Post, but submitted photographs have to have been taken in Starston any time after 1st June 2016.

There are two age categories:

Junior: Up to 16 years old on 1st June. Senior: Over 16 years old on 1st June 2016

There will be 2 prizes in each category. £25 for the winner and £15 for the runnerup. There will also be a separate Village Prize - £20 in each category.

The Rules are as follows:

- Photographs must show some aspect of life in Starston, indoors or out
- Only one photograph per person is permitted
- Entries must be printed photographs with a maximum size of 10" x 8". All entries will be put up in the Jubilee Hall for the village judging, so bear that in mind when deciding on the print size
- A title is required for each picture
- Anyone who has ever sold a photograph for money is not eligible to enter
- Entrants must complete an entry form giving their name, age category and picture title
- Photo editing, such as cropping of an image or adjusting brightness etc., is permitted but no composite pictures will be allowed. Any entry which consists of a combination of more than one original picture will be disqualified
- Photographs may be taken digitally or on film. In addition to the printed entry we may also require a copy of the original digital image or the negative
- The winning photos will be printed in Pigeon Post. Other entries may also be but that will depend on space available. By entering the competition you give permission for publication in Pigeon Post and/or on the village web site
- The closing date for entries is 31st August 2016

The photographs will be judged by Frances Crickmore from Flixton. Frances is a wildlife photographer whose work regularly appears in the EDP.

Village Prize. Before the main winners are announced we will hold an exhibition of all submitted photos in the Jubilee Hall where people from Starston can look at the photos and vote on "the people's favourite", one in each category. Only entries from people living in Starston will be eligible for the Village Prize.

# Starston Traffic Problems - the History

Traffic – especially the speed of it – has been a perennial problem in Starston. Other issues have been contentious but have been resolved one way or another and the dust has settled. But concerns about traffic are always with us.

The Parish Council recently asked me to do a short report to brief councillors on the history of Starston's traffic problems. In preparing that report I drew on Parish Council minutes, the *Pigeon Post* archive and an account written by one of the residents who tackled the issue in the 1990s. For my own convenience my trawl through these documents started with the Council minutes in 1991 when the hand written records gave way to printed.

At that time the national speed limit of 60 mph applied to all roads in Starston and the road from the Pulhams through Starston to Harleston was a B-road. The Parish Council repeatedly lobbied the County Council's Highways Department for traffic calming measures to reduce the speed of vehicles and the large number of accidents that were occurring. Highways refused to implement a 30 mph limit through the village, claiming that they were merely following government guidelines and, on one occasion, that such a limit could not be applied to roads without street lights!

At the end of 1994 a group of concerned residents decided that enough was enough and came together to form the Ad Hoc Traffic Group. They did traffic surveys and logged the many accidents; they canvassed village opinion and held public meetings; they got press coverage and enlisted the active support of our then District Councillor and County Councillor. Meanwhile the Parish Council also continued its lobbying for traffic calming measures.

Eventually the County Council agreed a package of measures which were implemented in the later part of the 1990s. These measures included the closure, or part closure, of Bunns Lane and Hallwong Lane to motor vehicles and the laying of black simulated cobbles on the road on the north side of the bridge across The Beck, to encourage vehicles to approach it straight on.

The Ad Hoc Traffic Group and the Parish Council continued to lobby for a 30 mph speed limit on The Street and elsewhere in the village. Then in 1998 the B-road through Starston from the Pulhams was reclassified as a C-road and shortly afterwards the County Council announced, for no reason that I could discover, that the stretch of road on either side of the bridge was to have a 20 mph speed limit. The road surface would be red, there would be no white lines in the middle and "village gateway" signs would be erected – all visual indications to draw drivers' attention to the limit.

This scheme, finally implemented in full in 2001, was hailed as pioneering and received much national, as well as local, coverage. However all other roads in



# Starston Traffic Problems - Today

Since the original traffic measures were eventually finally implemented in 2001 we have lost the red road covering that was meant to indicate a lower speed area along The Street. Apparently it is too expensive to renew. However, we now have a village Speed-Watch team and we recently published data they collected which showed that in one month alone, more than 73% of 39,000 cars were exceeding the speed limit.

This was the Speed-Watch team report for the Annual Village Meeting in May.

Starston, along with most other rural communities, has the means to monitor traffic speed at strategic points throughout the village and a handheld facility to record speeds at points of particular concern. So what is the objective of collecting data and what can it be used for? Obviously it can be passed to the police who can then decide whether to come along and penalize speeding drivers or not. Alternatively, as a community, we can use it as the basis of reflection on the effects of our own road use.

Statistics produced by the Department of Transport for 2014 suggests that although there are more accidents in urban areas, 59% of fatalities occur on rural roads and can be attributed to the higher speeds and the more winding nature of such roads compared to those in urban areas.

These statistics reinforce the purpose of Community Speed-Watch and for me it really highlights the responsibilities we each have as road users. Reality suggests the condition of the roads, the needs of other road users and the unexpected, set the standard for safe driving and with an overall regard for maximum speed limits

So for me there are some basic rules: consider the needs of other road users, expect the unexpected, allow enough space to react safely, getting there in one piece is more important than overtaking the car in front. We should remember that the statistics only represent incidents that are reported to and recorded by the police. I am looking forward to the data from SAM2, now he has been refurbished, and I hope the data produced and interpreted will have a new relevance to us all in Starston.

and through the village retained the 60 mph limit. The Traffic Group continued to lobby but it wasn't until 2006, five years later, that 30 mph limits were finally in place on parts of Church Hill, Railway Hill and the Rushall Road.

The history of traffic calming measures in Starston shows what tenacity, commitment and hard work can achieve, but, as we all know, a legal framework is one thing – enforcement is quite another.



# **County Council News**

Following the recent Annual General Meeting at Norfolk County Council there has been a change of administration. The leader of the now Conservative-led council is Cliff Jordon. Under this administration I have been elected to serve as the Chairman of EDT (Environment, Development, Transport) so I look forward to this position and the challenges ahead.

A record number of Norfolk's young people have voted to elect nine new Members of a Youth Parliament representing each of the county's political constituencies. A total of 39,938 of Norfolk's 11 – 18 year olds cast their vote by text on their mobile phones. This represents a 51% turnout. The MYP for South Norfolk is Bethayne Webb who attends Diss High School.

One of my longtime hobbies is stock judging with Diss Stockmens Club and during the spring we visit four separate farms to judge Pigs, Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle and Sheep. 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## Summer of Swifts

A project that took root in Harleston last November, to support and nurture its diminishing population of migratory swifts as they return to historical nesting sites to rear their young, is rolling out the first phase of its programme. The programme, organised by Harleston's Future, comprises display of a huge decorated swift cut-outs mobile, town-wide flag displays and nesting box production.

It was early August last year that the town's swift colonies left on their long migration to spend the whole of winter, continuously on the wing, in the warmer climate of many African lands. We saw the welcome return of these remarkable birds to this area in May to reclaim their traditional homes – but the population is in trouble, and many nesting pairs will find their nest spaces (for example under eaves and tiles) blocked, and with new building development (domestic and commercial) providing no viable alternatives.

Phase 1 of Swift Action Harleston, with crucial support from South Norfolk Council Communities and Market Towns
Initiative, and through extensive voluntary input, has been to raise awareness of the plight of swifts and to develop a programme to make and install new nest boxes for the birds to set up home and raise their families. These boxes are being constructed and installed in phases with the first pilot batch in place at Harleston Primary School, Archbishop Sancroft High School and Malthouse Court retirement complex. More will follow in the coming weeks and months. The aim is to have 100 new nest sites available by 2017.

The RSPB says: "Swifts spend their life almost entirely on the wing and even feed, sleep and mate in flight. They feed exclusively on insects and only come to land when nesting. Swifts are unobtrusive when nesting and make perfect, quiet neighbours. Swifts use roof spaces in buildings where they construct a simple nest, entering and leaving quietly through a narrow hole and leave few, if any, droppings below the entrance. The swift is one of the last summer migrants to arrive in the UK, and the first to leave for the long return migration. It is estimated that swifts fly an average daily total of 800km (nearly 500 miles) — or about 2 million km (more than 1.24 million miles) in a lifetime!

They never perch on wires like swallows but if you look up in the sky in summer, you might see excited screaming parties of them careering madly at high speed around rooftops and houses, often low, especially towards dusk."

If you can help by providing suitable places for swifts to nest, then please do so.

# Arnold Wesker - Playwright

Sir Arnold Wesker, who died in April at the age of 83, was the author of 50 plays, 4 volumes of short stories, 2 volumes of essays, a children's book, extensive journalism, poetry and other writings. He was knighted in the 2006 New Year's Honours list. Two of his earliest plays, **Roots** and **The Kitchen**, were set in Norfolk where he had family with whom he stayed in close touch. One of those family members was Keith Keeble from Starston.

"Arnold was 13 years older than me and was an inspiration to me all his life. He was a generous man, generous with his time and his patience. I first became aware of him when I was 10 years old. The occasion was the wedding of Arnold and Dusty and I was playing football with two of my cousins when my badly aimed kick sent the football straight into the wedding cake, sending it flying on to the floor where it shattered into pieces. I was certain I would get slaughtered but when Arnold saw it he simply said: 'Saves having to cut it up,' and that was that.

In the days before his first play was performed Arnold would do anything to learn his craft, exploring how different professionals worked. Often he would take me with him so I met Benjamin Britten, the film producer Daryl F Zanuck, Peter O'Toole and many others. I was fascinated by what Arnold was doing. He knew he wanted to write plays but he also knew that he had a lot to learn. And as he was learning, he was helping me at the same time. He would always take the time to explain things to me and when, as a young man, I decided I wanted to start my own business it was Arnold who took the trouble to introduce me to various people who knew about business management to give me the administrative skills that I needed.

The first serious play I ever saw was Arnold's first major success, *Chicken Soup With Barley* which was staged by the Royal Court in London. Many years later, with a lot more plays under the belt, Arnold came to Harleston and spent a day with students at

Archbishop Sancroft school, introducing them to the realities of the theatre. As I said, he was always generous with his time.

Arnold gave the toast on the occasion of Janet's and my 25th wedding anniversary in 1997, a great privilege for both of us. He always said: 'If in doubt, always have a go.' He helped me a lot in many ways but more than that, he opened my eyes to a much wider range of possibilities than I would have found on my own.


