Notes from A Starston Garden

Name That Plant

"What's that?" asked my friend Teresa, pointing to a plant with an ungainly appearance but beautiful blue flowers, much frequented by bees. I had to admit that I didn't know but as it was part of the Pictorial Meadows mix (which I mentioned last month) I'd be able to find out and let her know. A few days later I looked out the seed packet which was singularly unhelpful; it had a pretty picture of the *Patchwork Quilt* mixture which it contained, but no details of the species that made up the patchwork.



The company's catalogue and web site were almost as unhelpful, merely saying the seed mix had over twenty species which included species such as meadow buttercup, musk mallow, field scabious etc. etc. Well I knew my mystery plant wasn't any of those but by using Google Images to check the species I didn't know I've been able



to identify it as viper's bugloss. Sorted.

However I've had less success with another plant identification problem. This photo was sent to me by a friend in Staines called Anne who's discovered it on a bit of land she bought at the back of her garden. "I didn't plant it," she said. Well, no, most of us wouldn't as it's not an object of beauty. I didn't know what it was so I sent the picture to Roberta, who's very knowledgeable about plants. She didn't know what it was either. So I've posted it on Facebook which brought various responses including a thought that it might be henbane and the suggestion that it could be a member of the plant family which includes potatoes, tomatoes – and deadly nightshade.

I reckon what's needed is a phone app which allows you to capture an image of a plant and then compare it with a stored library of images to come up with a definitive answer. If such an app exists I'd be delighted to hear about it or, if that's still pie in the sky, an answer to Anne's identification problem.

For those of you who are thinking of entering but are not sure where to start here is some guidance from the novelist and short story writer, Zoë Fairbairns. Zoë is the author of a Teach Yourself Book "*Write Short Stories and Get Them Published*" which offers lots of good advice to would-be writers. The book is published by Hodder Education (ISBN 978-1-444-12403-3).

This is the list of Zoë's top 10 points to keep in mind when writing a short story.

- 1. Short stories are short.
- 2. And they are stories. Something has to happen.
- 3. When it has happened, end the story.
- 4. If you are a beginner, restrict yourself to the first person and the past tense until you are more confident.
- 5. Let the narrator tell the story as if they were talking to a friend.
- 6. Centre your story around one person in a situation of difficulty, and show how that difficulty is resolved or not resolved.
- 7. If your factual story wants to turn itself into fiction, let it.
- 8. And vice versa.
- 9. But don't give in to pressure to say which is which.
- 10. Value friends who respect your writing.

We've all written stories of one kind or another in letters, in a diary or just telling someone about something that has happened to you. It's great fun so why not have a go. The competition is open to anyone who lives or works in Starston and the winning entries will be published in Pigeon Post next year.

Parish Council News

Ward Boundaries – the pattern of wards is intended to reflect the interests and identities of local communities, as well as promoting effective local government, whilst achieving roughly the same number of electors for each district councillor across the county. As Starston Parish Council, we responded to the LGBC (Local Government Boundary Commission) back in July advising that we wish to remain in a ward with other rural parishes. The South Norfolk District Council submission to the LGBC has proposed that Starston, along with Redenhall, Needham, Brockdish and Harleston, becomes one ward with two District Councillors. Cllr Clayton Hudson has supported the Parish Council preference and has submitted an alternative proposal to LGBC, suggesting a ward composed of Starston, the Pulhams, Rushall and Dickleborough. This proposal has also received the backing of Cllr Martin Wilby. With the initial consultation period now closed, LGBC will consider all submissions and develop proposals on ward boundaries for further public consultation between November 2016 and January 2017.

Free Community Superfast Wifi Broadband – this should be going live at the Jubilee Hall in October 2016. It will be accessible from both within the hall and from the car park. Please keep an eye on the Starston Village website notices for the go-live date. The service will be provided for at least 2 years, funded from grants and Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) monies. The Jubilee Hall Trustees and Parish Council will monitor its usage, which will help inform whether this community service will continue to be provided in the longer term. Please keep us informed of your experience of this free Wi-Fi village facility. It would also be interesting to know the circumstances under which you use it, eg loss of broadband at home; children's party streaming music/ films; accessing the internet whilst attending a meeting at the Jubilee Hall etc.

Parish Councillor Vacancy – the Banks family are moving from Starston, which has created a vacancy on the Parish Council. If you are community minded, like finding solutions to problems, listening to people, supporting village initiatives and deciding how to spend a limited amount of money within the parish, this could be for you. The Role of a Parish Councillor

This is a brief summary of the role of a Parish Councillor as it relates to Starston

- A Parish Councillor is responsible to all people who are resident in the Parish
- Councillors are required to liaise regularly with other councillors, local authorities and residents
- The period of service is 4 years or until the next election (2019) with possible extension
- There is no salary as this is a voluntary position, though expenses may be paid in certain circumstances
- Councillors in Starston are not affiliated to any specific political party

Main Purpose of a Parish Councillor

This is to represent the views of all residents within your parish.

Secondary purposes

These include:

- Deciding on how much to raise through the Council Tax in order to deliver your Parish Council's services.
- Influencing and shaping the long term development policy for the Parish and, as part of the planning process, comment on planning applications in the Parish.
- Improving the quality of life and the environment in your local area.
- Working to identify issues which are important to the lives of the residents you represent.
- Working to bring about improvements through local projects, lobbying other service providers and working in partnership with other parishes and agencies.

In order to become a Parish Councillor you must:

- Be over 21 and on the electoral register
- Be a resident of the parish for which you are standing (although there are certain exceptions)
- Be able to attend regular evening meetings (in Starston meetings are held 6 times year)
- Have an interest in local issues and things which affect people
- Have an understanding and willingness to represent the views of the whole community

Further details are available on the Parish Council section of the village website, from the Norfolk Association of Local Councils or by talking to Ann Leitch, Chairman of Starston Parish Council.

County Council News

Norfolk County Council's Library Service has launched Spydus Mobile, a free app that residents can download onto their smartphone or tablet to access library services and manage their membership at any time, "on the move". The app allows users to search for books, place holds on interesting items, download e-books and audio books, keep track of their library account and manage their loans. To download Spydus Mobile for Apple and Android devices visit the App Store or Google Play and select Norfolk Library and Information Service.

The Waveney Valley is well known for its beautiful market towns and attractions so, to attract and inspire more tourists to visit these locations, a photographic exhibition has been installed at Diss Railway Station. The project is a partnership between Abellio, NCC, South Norfolk Council, Diss Town Council and the Waveney Valley Towns Team.

Devolution Update: The results from the public consultation (11,000 responses) show a majority of respondents generally in favour of the devolution proposals, but there are also many concerns about the proposal of a Mayor for the combined authority of Norfolk and Suffolk. There is to be a County Council meeting on 3rd November where a decision will be taken whether to proceed or not.

Good Luck to Robin Twigge and Frances Hopkins with their new Swift Piano Bar at the Swan Hotel in Harleston. Southern Hemisphere Adventure 1: Australia

The Red Phone Box

As BT prepares to remove many of the familiar red telephone boxes from our streets, (including possibly the one in The Street in Starston) it might be interesting to take a look at the history of this iconic structure.

In 1921 Britain's first standard kiosk, the imaginatively named Kiosk No 1 (abbreviated to K1) was introduced. Its design was conservative and appeared somewhat old-fashioned. The first red Telephone Box was a K2, introduced in 1926 and over the next nine years some 1,700 examples were installed, mostly in London. K3 had a short life, then came K4 which incorporated a stamp machine and post box. In 1935 the GPO commissioned K6 (K5 never made it to

production) to commemorate the Silver Jubilee of George V and they installed these in all towns and cities with a Post Office. The first K7 models in 1962 were ahead of their time; the use of aluminium and extensive use of glass would only be adopted by the GPO's successor, British Telecom, in the 1980s. The K8 kiosk reverted to tried and trusted cast-iron and was introduced in 1968 in Westminster, London.

By 1981 the Post Office was split into two separate businesses: British Telecommunications and the Post Office. This was a prelude to the privatisation of the telecommunications side of the business, which was completed in April 1984. Since then the majority of red Telephone Boxes have either been removed or replaced with BT branded modern kiosks. The final



challenge to the kiosks has been the change in the telecommunications market. Between 2005 and 2008 payphone usage in the UK halved. From a peak of 92,000 kiosks, around 51,500 survived and today just 11,000 kiosks remain.

In March 2006, as part of a competition to find Britain's favourite design icon since 1900, the Telephone Box was placed in the top ten. As kiosk usage declined further, the company developed an "Adopt a Kiosk" scheme, allowing local authorities to adopt under-used kiosks for £1.00, with the community assuming responsibility for maintaining them. By September 2011 around 1,500 communities across the UK had adopted a kiosk. Many have been converted as homes for Public Access Defibrillators as part of a scheme between BT and The Community Heartbeat Trust. The "Adopt a Kiosk" scheme demonstrates a number of points: the strength of local communities; individuals and communities standing up to preserve and maintain our heritage; communities uniting in a voluntary capacity to maintain a community asset; the fondness amongst the British public for the red Telephone Box; and the importance of keeping adopted kiosks at the heart of local communities.

Borderhoppa Drivers Needed

Can you spare some time to help with a vital community service? Borderhoppa, the provider of community transport across more than forty parishes in South Norfolk, urgently needs volunteer drivers to help with regular outings for residents in the areas covered by the scheme.

"Community transport works because of the goodwill and time given by people who volunteer as drivers, office staff and trustees" explains Lucy Edwards, Borderhoppa Manager. "What we really need right now are drivers to help with our special outings, including trips to the coast, lunches and visits to garden centres."

Service users value the outings as ways of getting out and about and meeting up with friends, which many people are otherwise unable to do, either because they don't have a car or don't have access to a regular commercial bus service to and from where they live.

"Social isolation and loneliness are real problems in rural areas, especially for older residents," said Lucy, "and community transport is often that vital link to being able to get out and about, contributing to good health and mental well-being."

Volunteers are the lifeblood of community transport across Norfolk and volunteer drivers are always welcome (drivers need to have a D1 category on their licence, basically entitlement to drive a minibus with no more than 18 passengers). Mileage expenses are paid but the time commitment is a gift to the community.

Somme Centenary Commemoration

Norman and I were fortunate to win tickets in the ballot for the Thiepval Somme Centenary Commemoration event on 1st July, which you may have seen on television. It was a moving and humbling experience. We went with a friend from the Royal British Legion, and together we laid the Dickleburgh RBL wreath at the Cross of Sacrifice at Thiepval to remember those men from our local parishes who died on the Somme battlefield, several of whom were killed on the first day, 1st July 1916. Over a dozen local men are commemorated on the huge and imposing Thiepval Memorial to the Missing, including Albert Brock, Philip Goldsmith, Frederick Osborne, John Roberts and George Cutting from Starston.

We were on a guided battlefield trip, so on the two days either side of the Thiepval event we toured the entire Somme front. We visited many of the major sites, especially those relating to the 1st July 1916 when 19,240 British and Commonwealth men died as they went 'over the top' and walked (assuming the Germans had been wiped out by the artillery barrage and because it was not seemly for British troops to run) across No Man's Land towards the German trenches.

The whole trip was a deeply moving experience, but several moments stand out laying a wreath on my great uncle's grave at Delville Wood; seeing the area around High Wood where he was killed and initially buried; the Sunken Lane in No Man's Land, just below the Hawthorn Ridge and Crater where so many of the Lancashire Fusiliers were mown down by German machine guns on 1st July; and the former Royal Marines who yomped this summer from Grimsby to Sheffield Park on the Somme to lay 19,240 poppy crosses and numerous wreaths in memory of the Pals Battalions that were decimated on the Somme.

> They went with songs to the battle, they were young, Straight of limb, true of eye, steady and aglow. They were staunch to the end against odds uncounted; They fell with their faces to the foe.

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.


